Pope Francis appointed Jose Fuerte Cardinal Advincula as the 33rd archbishop of Manila in an announcement released on Thursday, March 25, 2021. He was appointed to succeed Cardinal Luis Antonio Tagle whom he appointed Prefect of the Congregation for the Evangelization of Peoples in the Vatican in 2019.


Why Pope Francis appointed a cardinal from Capiz the new Manila archbishop

A fellow priest sheds light on what could have been the reason Pope Francis appointed Jose Fuerte Cardinal Advincula the 33rd archbishop of Manila "The God of Surprises strikes Capiz again!"

Bishop Victor Bendico of Baguio made the exclamation after Pope Francis appointed Capiz Archbishop Jose F. Advincula one of the 13 new Cardinals last November. Now that Cardinal Advincula, 68, had been named by Pope Francis as the new archbishop of Manila, the premiere See of the country. Bishop Bendico, who was rector of the Capiz cathedral under Advincula before he was appointed Bishop of Baguio by Pope Francis in 2017, was exclaiming to the heavens once more: "Another surprise!" When Advincula was made cardinal, everyone



A Gift to be Given: 500 Years of Christianity in the Philippines

When one receives a gift, one thinks that gift is meant for him to keep. One does not have to feel that he has the obligation to share it with others. Think about this: how can the mug you might have received last year be shared with others?

This year marks the 500th year since the Portuguese explorer, Ferdinand Magellan reached our country's shores bearing a gift that he gave to our ancestors. He did this even with the knowledge that he only stumbled upon our islands and our people on the way to get to the spice islands of Moluccas.

However, the gift was not a mug nor anything else that may have any semblance of temporal value. It was a gift of a spiritual nature: it was the gift of the Christian faith. Unlike the mug you may have received, the Christian faith is a gift to be given and Ferdinand Magellan, five centuries ago, might have echoed through his actions the very instructions Jesus tells us through His disciples in the Gospel of Matthew (Mt. 10:8 NABRE) when He was sending them out on a mission, "...Without cost you have received; without cost you are to give."

Chrisma Bangaoil: Serving the Church through the Poor

Editor's Note: In celebration of the 500 Years of Christianity, we are featuring an alumna who has devoted years of her life in the service of the Church.

While so many churches have struggled to keep the crowds from participating in the celebration of the sacraments, a lay Thomasian missionary has continued to reach out to the least, the lost and the last, even more during the pandemic.

Chrisma C. Bangaoil graduated with the degree of Behavioral Science from the University in 1992. She has been an active lay missionary in various parts of the country for the past 20 years, 13 years of which has been mostly spent doing mission with the poor in various barangay chapels in the Diocese of Dipolog in Zamboanga del Norte.


Chrisma is from northern Luzon, an Ilocana who started out speaking zero Visayan, Ilonggo or any of the dialects in the region where about 80 percent of the residents are Subanen. She has discovered, however, that some areas in Mindanao have Ilocanos as minorities or tribes, and that Mindanao is not really as dangerous as some think.

Together with Fr. Joel P. Agad, alumnus of the UST Ecclesiastical Faculties, Chrisma has been deeply involved in pastoral work called "Love the Poor Program" which won first prize in the 2020 Capstone Projects Award of the Pontifica Universita della Santa Croce (Pontifical University of the Cross) in Rome.

But how did it all start? Chrisma shared that her missionary spirit had been greatly influenced

was asking: Why him of all the bishops in the Philippines?

All the news that followed gave us some hints, but not enough to answer the big question. Fr. Cris de Asis of the Archdiocese of Capiz found it disturbing that it might suggest Msgr. Advincula was unworthy when "in truth he really is worthy."

Perhaps, this little mystery is because of the fact that Msgr. Joe, as we fondly call Advincula, served zealously yet silently away from the limelight. Let this little window allow us to see our Cardinal Jose F. Advincula (born 1952) in a better light – particularly his pastoral ministry.

A cursory look at Msgr. Joe's 45-year ministry as a priest and as bishop would tell us that nothing seems spectacular about it. Except for some years spent in Manila where he took up theology at the Pontifical University of Santo Tomas, and in Rome, where he finished canon law at the Angelicum, Msgr. Joe spent most of those years as professor and formator in four seminaries, namely: St. Joseph Regional Seminary (Jaro), Immaculate Conception School of Theology (Vigan), St. Pius X Seminary (Capiz), and Sancta Maria Mater et Regina Seminarium (Capiz). He served as rector in both seminaries in Capiz.

He served as pastor of a parish for barely two years before he served as Bishop of San Carlos for 10 years. Then he was appointed as Archbishop of Capiz where he has been serving until now for almost nine years.

As a bishop, he has served in various capacities in the Catholic Bishops' Conference of the Philippines. At present, he serves as vice chairman of the Committee on International Eucharistic Congress and the Office on Women. In the apparent absence of anything that seems spectacular, what is extraordinary about our new Cardinal-Archbishop of Manila is how faithfully and zealously he fulfilled his pastoral responsibilities to the best of his ability for almost 45 years.

So, why him as Cardinal and new primate of the Philippine Catholic Church? Fr. Marvin Funa of the Archdiocese of Capiz gave his opinion: "Because Msgr. Joe's pastoral priorities answer the pressing need of the Church today, that is, reaching out to the 'peripheries'." Gerald O'Connell of America magazine highlights a similar point: "The primacy of the church at the peripheries has been a key theme in Francis' selection of cardinals. He has used the cardinalate to reach communities in countries that are experiencing poverty, conflict and political tension."

Our Holy Father must have seen how the Cardinal-elect has long shared his pastoral vision as reflected in the latter's pastoral ministry for 45 years.

Msgr. Joe's pastoral ministry indeed leads us towards reaching out to the peripheries. Among his pastoral priorities, the following stand out: the establishment of mission stations and mission schools, the establishment of Merciful Missionaries of St. Joseph, aggressive initiatives

in the areas of social action, mass media, infrastructure, education, diocesan synod, ongoing formation and further studies of the clergy, and the sending of priests to help other dioceses (within and outside the country) and to serve the need of the Universal Church.

Such concrete initiatives paint, in broad strokes, the pastoral profile or ministry of Msgr. Joe. According to Bishop Bendico, "Are they not means and ways of bringing the church closer to the poor, to the peripheries" in accord with the pastoral vision and priorities of our Holy Father?

Msgr. Cyril B. Villareal, vicar general of Capiz, recalled how Msgr. Joe as a priest (two decades and a half ago) zealously created and implemented a pastoral program for the Capiz theology seminarians of reaching out to the people in the far-flung upland areas of Tapaz, Capiz in order to evangelize and catechize them and thereby prepare them for the reception of the sacraments.

In fact, his pastoral program of establishing mission stations and mission schools in far-flung areas in the dioceses of San Carlos and Capiz must have been the blossoming of such pastoral vision of tending to the peripheries. As it turns out, it was, in retrospect, undoubtedly a concrete step along the pastoral direction of Pope Francis. In an interview with Vatican News last October, Msgr. Joe shared how he worked in two rural dioceses in his ministry as a priest and bishop. With that in mind and after speaking with his fellow bishops and priests, he came to this realization: "Perhaps the Holy Father really wanted to communicate to the people in the peripheries that they too are being attended to by the Church." And Advincula shares the same conviction: "I always thought that the Church has to be closer to the people, especially those that are in the peripheries. So this might be a way the Holy Father wants to convey to the people the presence of the Church in the peripheries."

Such pastoral works are born out of the core pastoral conviction of Msgr. Joe, as fruits of his episcopal motto, Audiam (I will listen). "Listening," said Fr. Virgilio Ciudadano Jr., former chancellor of Capiz, "as an essential aspect of communication, creates closeness and builds Christian communities; it provides an encounter rooted in mercy which our Holy Father constantly proclaims."

Msgr. Freddie B. Billanes attests from his personal experience how Msgr. Joe has listened to him: "When I went through some concerns and difficulties as rector of St. Pius X Seminary and now as rector of the Cathedral, Msgr. Joe was and continues to be fully supportive to me in his distinctive ways. I am assured that I can always talk to him about my concerns both as my Archbishop and as my father."

When the Vatican announced he would be made cardinal, Msgr. Joe told Fr. Emil Arbatin, the Capiz archdiocesan mass media spokesperson: "I ask God for the grace that I may be able to perform this task given to me. Lord, this is your Church.

Use me as your instrument, use your priests, use your people."

In a letter to Msgr Joe, Pope Francis wrote: "It will do your heart good to remember, amid such joy, the entrance of Jesus in Jerusalem... and the Friday that followed." Isn't this the very same spirit that truly fills the heart of our beloved Cardinal—and new Manila Archbishop--Jose F. Advincula Jr. - Fr. Francis Payo, Licentiate and M.A. Theology and Ph.D. Philosophy

Who is Cardinal Advincula?

CARDINAL JOE, as he is fondly called, was born in Dumalag, in the Archdiocese of Capiz, on March 30, 1952. After completing his elementary studies in Dumalag, he moved to St. Pius X Seminary in Roxas City, where he obtained his high school and philosophical studies. He then attended theology courses at the University of Sto. Tomas in Manila.

He was ordained a priest for the archdiocese of Capiz on April 4, 1976 by the late Archbishop Antonio F. Frondosa. He was later appointed Spiritual Director of St. Pius X Seminary, also holding the positions of Professor and Dean of Studies. Later, he began his studies, first in Guidance and Counselling at the De la Salle University in Manila and then in Canon Law at the Angelicum in Rome, obtaining Licentiate in Canon Law.

Returning to his homeland, he served in the Immaculate Conception School of Theology in Vigan, Ilocos Sur, the Regional Seminary of Northern Luzon and then in St. Joseph Regional Seminary of the Western Visayas in Jaro, Iloilo.

In 1995, he was appointed Rector of the St. Pius X Seminary of Capiz, also becoming Defender of the Bond, Promoter of Justice and finally Judicial Vicar in Capiz archdiocese. In 1999, he became the first rector of Sancta Maria Mater et Regina Seminarium, the major seminary of Capiz. He was also assigned in Sto. Tomas de Villanueva Parish in Dao, Capiz as parish priest.

Msgr. Joe was appointed Bishop of San Carlos in Negros Occidental on July 15, 2001 and he received episcopal consecration on September 8, 2001 at the Immaculate Conception Metropolitan Cathedral.

On November 9, 2011 he was transferred to the Metropolitan Archdiocese of Capiz, on the Island of Panay, in the archipelago of Visayas. He was a member of the Episcopal Commission on Doctrine of the Faith and the Commission on Indigenous Peoples.

Olalia (former UST Health Service Director) to request assistance for possibly organizing an alumni chapter in Pampanga. This is part of OAR's mission to have UST Alumni Chapters in all the regions of the country and engage the Thomasian graduates in delivering community services align with UST's mission and vision.

One of the highlights of that event was the impressively inspiring presentation of the accomplished projects of Tomasinong Bicolano under Dr. Rollo Milante. Dir. Carlos believed that this can be done in the other provinces like Pampanga. This idea was further reinforced by OAR's Spiritual Director and a Kapampangan, Rev. Fr. Pompeo De Mesa, O.P. He verbalized that he had been wondering how come there were alumni chapters already existing in many areas of the country but none in Pampanga, After a few minutes of discussion, "It is about time!" was the united conclusion. Dr. Olalia opined that the dynamic civic groups in Pampanga were mostly Thomasian-led and the time had come to gather them all under their beloved Alma Mater's umbrella.

Having worked with many of the driven women leaders of the province, Dr. Olalia called up one of the most prominent amongst them - Dr. Miguela T. Santiago - and informed her of the OAR Director's request. It only took this one phone call when a core group was born. Moved by the strong sense of loyalty to UST, the following Thomasians immediately responded: Alejandro P. Alviz from the College of Science, Teresita Cochon-Guanzon from the College of Commerce (Bus Ad), Violeta David-Gaerlan from the College of Commerce (Banking & Finance) and May Florence D. Narciso from the Faculty of Pharmacy. The following are from the Faculty of Medicine and Surgery: Dr. Aleni Estrellado-Araullo, Dr. Mildred Mañalac-Mariano, Dr. Olalia,

Dr. Miguela Ticzon-Santiago and Dr. Leticia Cordero-Yap.

Immediately, the group, now acting as the steering committee under the leadership of Dr. Mariano, planned and agreed that an organizational meeting for all Thomasian graduates of Pampanga should be held.

With great resolve, this meeting was held on July 4, 2015 in Bale Ugnayan in Betis, Guagua, Pampanga. With more than 70 loyal, enthusiastic and cheerful Thomasian alumni of Pampanga, TOMASINONG KAPAMPANGAN was officially born. The event was graced by the presence of Dir. Carlos who inspired those present with her message that we should be proud Thomasian alumni upholding competence, compassion and commitment as we align ourselves with our Alma Mater's mission to reach out to communities in need of Thomasian expertise and care. The Fulbright Experience: Scholarships for Research and Study in the US

The USTAAI Team Academics, true to its mission of creating an avenue for life-long learning for the students and alumni of the University, conducted a free webinar on "The Fulbright Experience: Scholarships for Study and Research in the US" on February 22, 2021. This was conducted in partnership with the UST Research Center for Social Sciences and Education (RCSSED) and the Philippine American Education Foundation, Inc. (PAEF). It was participated in by invited alumni, faculty and students of the University.



Mythical Carabao Story Instills Pinoy Values

Kids today have a new hero, who not only saves the day but also teaches them the importance of Filipino values. Meet *Cargasus*, *the flying carabao*, whose Filipino adventure tale was penned by Fr. Edgardo D. Alaurin, O. P., a Bicolano Dominican and currently the Regent of the University of Santo Tomas College of Fine Arts and Design.

Cargasus, the Flying Carabao is imbued with mythology, fantasy, and to some extent, folklore, in which the opus is familiarly Filipino. Inspired by Pegasus, the flying horse of mythical fame, Cargasus is a native carabao owned by an amiable, angelic-looking boy named Pikoy (christened Angelo Serapiko). Cargasus and Pikoy are intimately linked by extraordinary coincidence that brought them together like inseparable twins.

The initial setting is the pre-Christian era in a small village at the foot of Mt. Magayon (Mayon) where Pikoy and his pets, Labuyo, the wild rooster and Kahol, the mysterious dog, grew up together with his childhood friends and the faithful servant Aswud, who had a dark past that practically dominates the story. Pikoy's widowed father, Maguilas, raised him until he was twelve years old. This is where the story launches into more adventures that explore exotic places, such as Mas-bate (Masbate), Pan-ay (Panay), Gui-maras (Guimaras), Palaw-an (Palawan), Ming-danaw (Mindanao) and Sulukas (geographically possible, the Sulu deep).

Beautiful illustrations of carefully selected popular Filipino artists provide an experience filled with marvel, with the paintings and sketches of Roman Cruz, Thomas Daquiaog, Jaime de los Santos, Joseph Endiafe, Noel Flores, Caloy Gabuco, Jun Impas, Raphael Kalaw, Willy Layug, Ninoy Lumboy, Nemi Miranda, Al Perez, Augusto Santiago, Danilo Santiago, Ramil Tumampos, Noli Vicedo, and the author himself, Fr. Edgardo Alaurin. The details of the illustrations are described through story telling as Fr. Ed showed the rough drawings of ideas in a sketchpad that served as reference for the artistic rendition.

The gallery of artworks is also part of the virtual book launch held on November 22, 2020, in time for the author's birthday.

In his younger years, Fr. Ed was fond of reading storybooks and comics and watching movies, especially the classic novels of adventures, humor, and fantasy. He inherited his love of storytelling from his grandparents and imparted this to his nephews and nieces, and most recently to his grandnieces and grandnephews, who affectionately call him "Lolo Ed."

Following this cherished tradition of Filipino storytelling, it took nearly two decades for Fr. Ed to complete the saga of Cargasus. It's a gratifying read, endowed with twists and turns, values, moral lessons and a riveting catharsis in the end.

"There is a hero and innate goodness within each and every one of us. Life is full of adventures, filled with ups and downs. Better things happen without us expecting it. Things are both real and imaginative," says Fr. Ed. "The human mind will always be in search for what is good, beautiful and true. Ultimately, life is a mystery; but, we would eventually come to realize the real value of things freely given us as they come and go. These are the lessons learned," says Fr. Ed as he reflects on creating a legacy that combines his love for storytelling, the values he cherishes and the universality of art.

Cargasus, The Flying Carabao: Imagination and Folklore Beneath Its Wings A Book Review

Fiction, the playground for a writer's imagination, is where Dominican priest Rev. Fr. Edgardo D. Alaurin chose to frolic after a probative research book, a Mariology on a patroness' image in his provincial diocese. Fantasy adventure was even



more an unlikely genre for him to single out.

By his account however, his childhood cradled a playful and creative nature. In Legaspi City in Bicol province, amid mountains, hills, and a river, he immensely enjoyed a carefree life which included what his father taught him: riding a carabao and a horse. He also sustained a pastime love for comic books when his mother bought him The Classics Illustrated collection. Thus, his second book, Cargasus, The Flying Carabao, took roots. And took flight to another world, another time.

In the author's mind, Cargasus was sired by Pegasus, the beautiful flying white horse in Greek mythology (750-650 BC), who, when out of boredom in snowy Mount Olympus, flew far and wide, eventually landing in an island called Pearl of the Pacific. There, felled by volcanic rumblings, he was nursed by a female carabao whom he later got pregnant, unknowingly, and left to return to his realm of the gods. Mother died while the offspring half-carabao, half-horse survived.

Parallel to the birth of the baby carabao was the birth of Pikoy whose blood an asuwang (vampire) tried to lick through the roof of a nipa hut while his mother was dying. The father Maguilas battled with this creature who, after transforming into a boy during the chase, explained he merely inherited the curse from his grandfather who stole the mutya, a twin pearl in a vast ocean called Sulu. A good relationship then blossomed with the lad Aswud taken into

UST Gensan Campus on the Rise

The University of Santo Tomas recently started construction of one of its satellite campuses outside Manila. The decision to build a campus in General Santos city stemmed from previous studies based on the maximum number of current enrollees in UST Manila that were coming from the SOCCSKSARGEN area. Deciding on General Santos was a crucial decision at the time for the administration headed by previous Rector, Very Rev. Fr. Herminio V. Dagohoy, O.P., Ph.D. since it was also considering Davao. The decision was based on the fact that Gensan was a strategic location.

Rev. Fr. Dexter A. Austria, O.P., SThD, Director for the Facilities Management Office, together with Engr. Albert S. Surla, MSCE, Assistant Director and Engr. Romnick Amida, Inhouse Civil Engineer, visited the site. In an interview, he said that the perspective of UST Gensan would still incorporate the same European architectural design, reminiscent of the Spanish influence in the campus in Manila. The people of Mindanao will have something to look forward to in terms of another architectural milestone in UST Gensan that is situated in Bgy. Ligaya. The campus has a total area of 80 hectares, bigger compared with the 20-hectare campus of UST Manila and the 40-hectare campus of UST Sta. Rosa, Laguna.

According to Fr. Dexter, the University is looking at initially offering at least four major courses - Accountancy, Business, Pharmacy and Nursing. This may still change depending on the need when the University finally opens its academic doors to the people of Mindanao and other neighboring countries like Indonesia and Malaysia.

The construction of the Filial House of San Martin De Porres, which will house the Dominican priests, is nearing completion and is expected to be finished by the 2nd Quarter of 2021.

Another notable construction in the area is the Main Building. Although it has a modern architecture, the building will still have the iconic blue cross tower. It will be comprised of six floors with roof deck, according to Fr. Dexter. Taking into consideration the number of earthquakes in the area, the Main Building's structures and foundation are going to be built to be resistant to sideway loads and strong enough to take loads.

Another key feature being considered in this campus is the building of flood control catch basins. - Lynette E. Gallinero, UST Alumni SOX Chapter Secretary

To celebrate the 500th Year of Christianity in the Philippines, the Apostolate Committee of the College of Education Alumni Foundation Inc. (CEAFI) had its New Year gift-giving project for 100 Aeta Families of Sitio San Martin, Sto. Nino Bamban, Tarlac on January 23, 2021. The site, a partner community of the College of Education, was also hit by typhoons in December 2020.

Led by Board Director Ces San Juan and Internal Vice President Marielyn Quintana, the project solicited donations from generous alumni and friends so that the Aeta community could receive over PhP 500worth of food and home essentials. A coaster loaned by UST Simbahayan took the volunteers and the goods to Sitio San Martin's Day Care Center where the gift-giving took place.

The group who went on site was composed of CEAFI Board Members Ms. San Juan and Maureen Pickering, USTAAI Executive Assistant, Kaye Bundang, and other UST alumni and friends that included Coach Greg Colmenares and Jon Peran of TALA.

CEAFI coordinated with Loida Punzalan from Sitio San Martin, who helped organize the Aeta families there on the gift-giving day. Ms. San Juan said, "In spite of our early departure from UST and the continuous rain today, everyone went home happy."

Care was taken to distribute the goods in separate stations manned by CEAFI volunteers in the community day care center. Only 5 people at a time were allowed inside to practice social distancing and to comply with the COVID-19 precautionary measures. Station 1 gave out buckets with toiletries, slippers for adults and children, packs of rice, salt, and sugar. Station 2 handed out clothes, blankets and towels; 3 distributed Kopiko and chocolate tumblers; 4 gave giant loaves of bread; and the last station distributed grocery bags worth over Php 500, Katinko, and medicated shampoo. In 2019, OAR conducted a survey of all AIS registrants concerning the improvement of the website. Suggestions and comments from the alumni community were all taken into consideration in upgrading the system. After a year of revisions and test runs, OAR, with the assistance of Santo Tomas e-Service Providers (STePS), deployed the reconstructed website on soft launch to cater to the Class of 2020. Two new modules – for announcements and for online transactions - were opened. The first module will let the alumni view interests-related announcements directly from their accounts. And the lattermentioned module will direct the users to Thomasian Alumni Card applications and yearbook delivery service.

OAR aims to open the service to all batches by the start of the third quarter of 2021. This move will hopefully strengthen the community network and the number of registered alumni in the system.

A Gift to be Given: 500 Years of Christianity in the Philippines

The instructions of our Lord have become the inspiration of our jubilee this year, the "Year of Mission," and the guiding principle of its theme "Gifted to Give." This concept of being given to also give might be deemed as one of the many mysteries of our faith, a mystery that we cannot even start to understand because we give mugs to other people without really expecting them to share those with others or to pass them on to others. But even as muggiving Christians, especially Filipino muggiving Christians, we cannot deny ourselves this innate tendency of sharing our mug of Christian faith in the awe that we have about this divine mug of ours.

This awe has even been recognized by Pope Francis when he said, "You received the joy of the Gospel... and this joy is evident in your people... in your eyes, on your faces, in your songs and in your prayers. In the joy with which you bring your faith to other lands." He even referred to us being "smugglers of the faith." In celebration of this wonderful gift that we have received, the Church in the Philippines commemorates the 500 Years of Christianity this 2021.

In this commemoration, the Catholic Bishops' Conference of the Philippines (CBCP) has commissioned and approved on September 18, 2020 a logo of the celebration. The centerpiece of the logo shows Magellan's Chaplain, Fr. Pedro de Valderrama baptizing Rajah Humabon. This depiction was adapted from the painting of our National Artist Fernando Amorsolo, "The First Baptism in the Philippines."

The Conference has also prepared activities and projects to be implemented throughout the year to further highlight the gift that was given to be given despite the situation brought by the pandemic. On April 4, Easter Sunday, as we commemorated the Resurrection of Jesus, the Jubilee Doors in all cathedrals were simultaneously opened

and the jubilee year of the 500 Years of Christianity was opened in all parishes. On April 14, a reenactment of the first baptism took place in front of the Magellan's Cross in Cebu City and a Mass was offered along with the renewal of baptismal promises and the baptism of ten children at the Basilica del Sto. Niño, also in Cebu City. That was followed by a cultural show in the evening. In commemoration of the first baptism on the third Sunday of Easter 500 years ago, on April 18, cathedrals and parishes held baptisms. As our celebration also coincides with the Year of St. Joseph, a national consecration to him will be celebrated simultaneously in the parishes and cathedrals on May 1, while in the National Shrine of St. Joseph, the feast of St. Joseph the Worker will be commemorated. April 18 to April 22, 2022 will mark the second National Mission Congress, mission sending, and the closing of the jubilee year that will be held in Cebu City.

On December 8, on the feast of the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, the Year of St. Joseph will officially conclude. This closing will be followed by a consecration of families to St. Joseph as well as the official launching of the Confraternity of St. Joseph.

Lastly, as we continue to take on the challenge and the opportunities of online evangelization, various online activities connected to the celebration of the 500 Years of Christianity and Year of Mission have also been prepared. Most of these will be livestreamed at the Facebook page of the CBCP Episcopal Commission on Mission and other partner organizations such as Radio Veritas, TV Maria and other FB pages featuring 500 Years of Christianity in the Philippines.

As customary during jubilee years, plenary indulgence will be received, as granted by Pope Francis through a decree dated February 25, 2021. The indulgence is gained when the faithful make a pilgrimage to any one of the jubilee churches before April 22, 2022 to receive the Sacrament of

Reconciliation and the Sacrament of the Eucharist and to pray for the intentions of the Holy Father. This should include praying for the fidelity of the Filipino people to their Christian calling, for the increase of priestly and religious vocations and for the defense of the family, concluding with the Lord's Prayer, the profession of faith, and an invocation to the Blessed Virgin Mary. A plenary indulgence removes all temporal punishment to cleanse us of our sins.

In the midst of the immense suffering that we have all been experiencing since last year because of the pandemic, we still and must find it in ourselves to seek joy and comfort in the gift of the Gospel, of the Good News, of the mug that has introduced us to the God of Israel, to the God of Ferdinand Magellan, and, ultimately, the God of our lives. This is because it is in Him that we have also found in ourselves the strength and will to survive the storms of the past year and the years to come. Much like 500 years ago, after a long and arduous journey through the seas of the Atlantic and the Pacific, we should be like Ferdinand Magellan and his crew after 2020 hungry, thirsty, sick, abandoned, mistrustful, and fearful. However, after that journey, on the island of Homonhon, they found the grace of God through our ancestors that welcomed them through giving them food, nursing their sick, and providing them a place for shelter.

We, too, find the grace of God through the Catholic Church that continues to nurture us and welcome us despite us being worldly mercenaries. It is now time for us to be missionaries, to let others take a sip from the mug, to give the gift that was meant to be given to those that are also hungry, thirsty, sick, abandoned, mistrustful, and fearful, and to take on the instructions of the Lord Jesus in the Gospel of Matthew (Mt. 28:19 NABRE) to "Go therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." – Fr. by her parents who were devoted servants of the Church. She grew up in a parish which was under the CICM missionary fathers.

Her present involvement in the local Church, however, started much later, after a number of her speech students at the UST Central Seminary had been ordained priests. They invited her to give talks and formation in their parishes, seminaries, schools and other assignments. In 2008, she was invited to give a talk to the college seminarians of the Cor Jesu Seminary in the Diocese of Dipolog. Since then, she has embarked on a more serious dedicated holistic mission to reach out to and help the poor. The Love the Poor Program. Even prior to the declaration Of 2014 as Year of the Poor, Chrisma, together with Fr. Joel, was already doing a number of initiatives for the poor parishioners of the St. Therese of the Child Jesus Parish in Polo, Dapitan City in Zamboanga del Norte. On this same year, 2 years after Fr. Joel erected the parish, he was transferred to a much bigger parish in a third-class municipality. It was there where the Love the Poor Program formally took shape. With the parish initiatives for the poor during the Year of the Poor, Chrisma saw the

deeper need of the poor parishioners in the very remote barangays. She observed that the poor were not only financially poor. Because of their poverty, they were also spiritually and morally poor. It's a vicious cycle of poverty. There was hunger and thirst in such far-flung areas that needed to be sated. Chrisma pointed out that poor people were not able to attend masses because they did not have the means to go to the church. They also needed to work to eat for the day.

"When we launched the Love the Poor Program, it was never meant to address only the need of the materially poor or spiritually poor but more the need of those who were both spiritually and materially poor. Eventually, the Love the Poor Program even became more encompassing to include those who were poor in other ways." Contrary to the understanding of a few, Love the Poor Program is not a dole out program nor a one-time or a seasonal gift giving that is funded by a few rich people. It is a life-giving program. It is a holistic program aimed at evangelizing the poor – particularly, but not limited to, those who are both materially and spiritually poor. It includes catechesis, parenting, youth and

adult faith formation, life skills building, creative and expert facilitation and conduct of Pre-Sacrament and Pre-Cana seminars, among others. Chrisma, together with the Love the Poor team (consisting mostly of youth she has also trained), visits barrio chapel communities, public schools, markets, and neighborhoods to bring Jesus' message of love and mercy.

What has sustained Chrisma and her missionary work? Chrisma beamed with joy with the question. She said that it is the grace of God that flows out from people who also share the heart of her mission but can't go for certain reasons. Chrisma's group never solicited or demanded people to give. Help keeps coming another proof of the success of the program and the Divine stamp on it.

Until when will she do what she does? She answered, "As long as I can still walk the slippery rough roads to reach those who can't go to or have been away from the Church. I would like to serve the Church still even when I am much older. When I don't anymore have the energy to walk up the mountains, animate the youth and the children, handle one training after the other from one place to another, I pray that I can still continue to serve the Church particularly in the Church Tribunal. But I have to have a degree to do that." Chrisma is in the last stretch of her Licentiate in Canon Law. She confessed that she struggled to finish her academic requirements because she also juggled between her regular work, teaching job, other engagements and mission work. She confessed that she needs to work and do other projects so she can sustain her mission (she pays for her fare and all other expenses).

The greatest struggle though that Chrisma has to deal with is not the language or the culture or the expenses or the dangers, but the attitude of some of the clerics and few clericalized lay who are not only unsupportive of missionary work but are also critical saying it's not sustainable and not Catholic.

But Chrisma, with the support of her family, friends, collaborators and Fr. Joel, continues to believe that when the Lord calls, He equips those who respond to the call; when the Lord sends, He sustains. "It's never about me. It's never about us. It is always about the Lord, His work, His mission. His grace suffices." - Chrima Bangoil with Winchell Campos.

received more than 200 awards and recognitions in the past 25 years, most notably as the first Filipino architectural firm included in the Top 500, Top 300, Top 200, and first ASEAN firm in the top 100 Architects of the World cited by the World Architectural Firms in the World of the London-based World Architecture Magazine. In fact, it is the only Southeast Asian architectural firm included in the list. In 2012, Palafox Associates ranked 89 in the list of the world's top 100 largest practices and top 8 in leisure projects.

Among his string of accolades, Arch. Palafox also studied Advanced Management Development Program for Real Estate and seven other special courses at Harvard University. In May 2017, the Polytechnic University of the Philippines (PUP) conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Fine Arts (Honoris Causa). In April 2018, he was conferred with these Honorary Titles: Doctor Fellow on Royal Institution of Singapore; Royal Institute of Architects, Singapore; Royal Institute of Development Consultants of Singapore; Royal Institute of Town and Regional Planners of Singapore.

This Thomasian architect has given lectures on urban planning and environment-friendly architectural development in more than 20 countries in Asia, Europe, and North America, including institutions like the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) and Harvard University. He has travelled to and has observed more than 1000 cities in 79 countries. He has actively participated in conferences, lectures, seminars, and fora organized by international groups, of which he is an associate or a member. He was also cited by Forbes Asia Magazine as one of the 48 Heroes of Philanthropy in Asia – one of four from the Philippines.

Arch. Palafox has served both the government and private sectors for four decades. In fact, BCI Asia has awarded Palafox Associates as BCI Asia's Market Leader in Architecture in the Philippines for nine consecutive years – 2005 to 2013. He is also the first architect-urban planner to become the President of the Management Association of the Philippines (MAP) in 2011, and now its lifetime member and President of the Philippine Institute of Environmental Planners (PIEP) in 2013 and 2014. At present, he is a Fellow and Executive Director for Government and External Affairs of the United Architects of the Philippines (UAP).

In a capsule, Arch. Felino A. Palafox, Jr., together with his Palafox Associates and Palafox Architecture Group Inc., now boasts of several local and international feathers in his cap. Some of these landmark projects are:

International: Urban Planning of Dubai, UAE; SM China; Saigon Golf and Country Club, Vietnam.

Metro Manila: Comprehensive Land Use Plan and Zoning, Manila; Rockwell Center, Makati; La Mesa Eco Park, Quezon City.

Luzon: MRT 7 Intermodal Transit-oriented development, Bulacan; Manila Southwoods, Cavite; Splendido Taal, Batangas; Summit Ridge, Tagaytay.

Visayas: Comprehensive Land Use Plan and Zoning, Iloilo City.

Mindanao: Puerto Princesa Streetscapes, Palawan; Divine Mercy Healing Shrine, Misamis Oriental.

MALLS: SM Malls - Las Pinas, QC, Pampanga, Iloilo, and Davao; Robinson Malls - Pampanga, Rizal, Pasig, and Mandaluyong.

Aside from the distinguished awards won by his firms, Arch. Palafox has received quite a number of awards, local and international, to his name, among others:

On top of all these awards and trophies, however, what Arch. Palafox treasures most is the fact that he belongs to a THOMASIAN FAMILY: his father, Dr. Felino Castro Palafox, Sr., graduated from the UST Faculty of Medicine &Surgery. His siblings are also UST alumni: Lauro - UST Central Seminary; Mary Margaret - Faculty of Medicine & Surgery; Fernando - Chemical Engineering; Francisco - Civil Engineering; Joseph - Architecture; Mary Hildegarde Conservatory of Music; Liborio - Mechanical Engineering. The love of his life is Wilma Villanueva Palafox - Arts & Letters 1974, Major in Economics, and Miss Arts & Letters 1974. His eldest child, Suzanne Katrina, graduated from the UST Faculty of Medicine & Surgery in 2002. There is no architect among his children, but the closest course in the build environment is Karima, who finished her Masters in Environmental Planning from the Oxford Brookes University in England in 2005. Arch. Palafox , his wife, and Karima are all Licensed Environmental Planners. During these pandemic times, the Palafox family has spent a lot of quality time together, with their Family Bible Study focused on a chapter or verse of their choice, followed by a discussion and sharing of each one's experience and personal insights.

When asked to comment on the crisis that the world is going through because of the pandemic, Arch. Palafox says that although he is not categorically making a paradigm shift, he is considering the planning and designing of projects to suit the times, with his environment advocacy as the ultimate goal: Covered courts for basketball, tennis, and volleyball; golf courses; restaurants with al fresco area (open air); indoor plants/ indoor gardens for interior design of houses; al fresco areas; and rainwater Harvesting. He also plans to be a moderator/speaker/host in webinars that are the landmark fashion of the period in order to answer the needs of our people at present.

Maguilas' household, becoming like an older brother to Pikoy. Similarly, the two also brought the baby carabao and a wild rooster during their trek home enabling the son to grow into the pets' boy-master.

This trio of characters – Maguilas, Pikoy, Aswud – up to the time the amiable Pikoy turned thirteen makes the story a wild adventure and the fantasy unfolding as pages in our early history. There are piracy in the ocean, banditry in villages, gory battles on the shore and underwater, captivity and slavery, tortures of captives and animals, kidnaps of women, treachery, and viciousness highlighting savagery in those times.

There are good people who exhibit valor and heroism, and also big doses of Christian virtues obviously reflecting the mission of the authorpriest. In the end, as in all comics sagas, heroes triumph and get their rewards as Maguilas, son Pikoy, and his friends do. So, do the boy's pet animals who also inject brawn and humor in the adventures: Cargasus (name given by Pikoy) flying over opponents and knocking them over with his super horsepower and magical ivory horns, and likewise, Labuyo, an omen-warning fowl.

Readers will find in this book ingredients that normally make for a good read: action, suspense, love, romance, humor, twists and surprises, even a grand wedding at the end. And a rare one too: about a hundred deftly rendered artworks (oil on canvas, pen/pencil/ink sketches, plates) depicting scene highlights and key characters. These obviously were intended to aid readers in picturing the other-worldly characters and scenarios in the author's creative imagination. They were done by notable artists with roots at the College of Fine Arts and Design of the University of Santo Tomas where Fr. Alaurin is the current Regent. Two artworks were from the author himself including the one gracing the cover.

Who will enjoy this book? Most likely, the generation entertained by characters in the cinema, TV and computer screens, even handheld mobile phones. Maybe, also their parents and grandparents around the author's age, raised likewise on comics (like Robin Hood, Three Musketeers, Ivanhoe) and continuing to contemporary screen heroes (Superman, Terminator, Lord of the Rings, Harry Potter et al).

Frankly, it may not be for the faint-hearted like me (and maybe, other women) who might find the conflicts in some chapters too graphic for comfort.

Cargasus The Flying Carabao can earn a place in Philippine literature, a new folklore with strong and inspiring characters, a familiar Philippine setting (there are references to Sulu, Palaw-an, Guimaras, Pan-ay, Ming-danaw), Filipino pillars like (bahay kubo, bayanihan, balangay), a spate of Christian traditions in the country like the Semana Santa, patron saints and archangels, Kristo, kapilya. Additionally, the name and concept of Cargasus alone are a stretch of a borderless imagination. - EA Lopez, Litt B in Journalism, UST Faculty of Arts and Letters 1969

Alumnus Ruben Nepales Donates Copy of His Book

Alumnus Ruben Nepales recently donated to the UST Miguel de Benavides Library a copy of his best-selling coffee table book, "Through a Writer's Lens" which was originally released as a limited hardbound edition that quickly sold out. The book is published by Bessie Badilla, a creative multihyphenate who also served as the art designer and layout artist of the book. This 254-page classic is a compilation of Nepales' two-decade work of more than 1000 often candid, refreshing snapshots of the Hollywood Stars whom he has interviewed and featured in his Philippine Daily Inquirer (PDI) column Only In Hollywood, a popular source of "What is New?" among the Hollywood celebrities, such as Oprah Winfrey, Jennifer Lopez, Sandra Oh, Kristen Stewart, Robert Pattinson, and a score of Filipino-American talents.

The book was received by Rev. Fr. Angel A. Aparicio, O.P., the Prefect of the Library; Ms. Maria Cecilia D. Lobo, the Chief Librarian; and Ms. Dianne Padilla, the Asst. Chief Librarian. Witnessing the event was Dean Marilu Madrunio of the Faculty of Arts & Letters.

Nepales is a proud alumnus of the UST Faculty of Arts & Letters. His wife, Janet, is an alumna too, and both of them are journalists based in Hollywood, USA. In 2012, Ruben held the singular distinction of being the first and only Filipino to have been elected as the Chairman of the Board of the Hollywood Foreign Press Association (HFPA), an association of international journalists that votes on and presents the prestigious Golden Globe Award. In June 2019, he was elected executive secretary of HFPA and was the managing editor of a special anniversary commemorative book, "Hollywood Foreign Press Association: A History (75 years of the Golden Globe Awards)."

At present, he also serves in the Board of Directors of the Filipino American Symphony Orchestra (FASO), the only Filipino symphony orchestra outside the Philippines. In 2012, Nepales published his first book, "My Filipino Connection: The Philippines in Hollywood" which won in the print journalism-book category of the Migration Advocacy and Media Awards presented by the Office of the President of the Philippines' Commission of Filipinos Overseas. It was in November 2020 when he released his second book, "Through A Writer's Lens", which became popularly acclaimed.

Nepales is also an award-winning journalist whose honors include prizes from the National Entertainment Journalism Awards – a U.S.- wide competition, and the Southern California Journalism Awards, presented by the Los Angeles Press Club. In the 60th Edition of the latter contest in 2018, Nepales won First Place for his feature on Angelina Jolie in the category Entertainment News or Feature (newspapers over 50K) over other finalists from the Los Angeles Times, LA Weekly, and Bloomberg Businessweek. He has found a new home in RAPPLER. He also contributes a monthly Hollywood Feature to SMILE Magazine, Cebu Pacific's inflight magazine.

He believes that upon leaving PDI and now at home in RAPPLER - "after 15 years when a door closes, another door opens."

FELINO A. PALAFOX, JR.: THE QUINTESSENTIAL THOMASIAN ARCHITECT

A true gold Thomasian alumnus, Architect Felino "Jun" Palafox was given the distinction and recognition by the UST Alumni Association Inc. (USTAAI) in 2009 by granting him The Outstanding Thomasian Alumni (TOTAL) award for his insurmountable contribution to, and advocacy for, environment-friendly architecture and internationally acclaimed urban planning projects here in the Philippines and abroad. In the same year, he was named among the People of The Year by the People Asia Magazine. His classic values were honed in his secondary education from the Christ the King Seminary (SVD) and these values were complemented and refined at the University of Santo Tomas where he earned his B.S. Architecture degree in 1972. In 1974, he obtained his master's degree in Environmental Planning at the UP Diliman through a scholarship grant by the United Nations Development Program (UNDP). He was also named as one of the Outstanding Thomasians among the UST 400 during the Quadricentennial Anniversary of the University in 2011.



Perhaps it is quite an interesting coincidence that this year, he celebrated his birthday on the 500th Anniversary of Christianity in the Philippines. With the Holy Mass concelebrated in Rome by Pope Francis himself and Luis Antonio Cardinal Tagle on the Quincentennial Jubilee of the Church in the Philippines, Arch. Jun Palafox could not ask for anything more.

In his student days in the College of Architecture and Fine Arts (CAFA), he was the perennial class president. He became the Editor-in-Chief of The Vision Magazine of the College. He garnered the highest number of votes among the candidates in the first ever popular election held in UST for the Central Board of Students (CBS). A devoted catechist, he was also the Student Representative named to welcome Pope Paul VI in UST. He was an energetic member of the Student Tourist Guides Bureau and the UST Representative to the National Union of Students of the Philippines (NUSP). But providentially, he was not among those activists who were incarcerated in the "First Quarter Storm" of the 70's. "I had a mission to fulfill," he admitted telling himself.

At 27, Arch. Palafox worked in the Government of Dubai, UAE, as Senior Architect and Planner from 1977 to 1981. It was here where he met Henry Sy, of the populist SM Malls, who later became his client and who encouraged him to return to the Philippines to pursue his advocacies of good governance and anti-corruption, as well as environment-care measures.

He founded the Palafox Architecture Group, Inc., his crowning glory. He led and managed his Palafox Associates and Palafox Architecture Group, Inc. in the planning of more than 16 billion square meters of land and the design and architecture of more than 12 million square meters of building floor area with more than 1,739 projects in the Philippines and in 39 other countries, to date.
