Rationale and Overview

Work-based learning^{1,2,3,4} provides students with authentic work experiences where they apply and develop employability and technical skills that support success in careers. Integrating the work-based learning continuum in the curriculum across several levels in education, from K to 12 to the peak of the Philippine Qualifications Framework, promotes a smooth school-to-work transition, allows students to map meaningful careers, and potentially narrows job-skills mismatch for graduates entering the workforce. With the rapidly changing needs of society, the emerging practices and technologies in the workplace, and the need to prepare students for jobs that may not yet exist at present, effective implementation of work-based learning will help prepare future-ready graduates.

Strong Academe-Alumni-Industry-Government (AAIG) partnerships are critical to the effective implementation of work-based learning. Curricular development in schools are anchored on intended learning outcomes and expected learning competencies that are validated against stakeholder needs. Alumni provide valuable input on the relevance, effectiveness and sufficiency of their school-based training to prepare them for the world of work. Employers in public and private sectors provide feedback on performance of graduates in the workplace, sufficiency of their knowledge and skills, as well as input on emerging skills that will need to be learned by future graduates. Government partnerships enable policy and funding support for enabling impactful contribution to national priorities and societal advancement particularly in the development of a strong workforce that will fuel the nation's economy.

The COVID-19 pandemic accelerated changes in the workplace, particularly the uptake of technology as well as emergence of new models of service delivery and product development. As we continue to ease up restrictions and reopen the country for economic recovery, stronger AAIG partnerships are even more imperative. The shift to remote instruction during the pandemic brought to fore innovative approaches to connecting with alumni, industry partners, and government collaborators to enrich students' learning experience. With the gradual resumption of face-to-face learning, students are expecting to resume in-person work-based learning.

The AAIG 2022 Caravan Series NCR Run hosted by the University of Santo Tomas, in collaboration with the UST Alumni Association, Inc., aims to:

- 1. Provide an overview of how the work-based learning continuum can be integrated into curricular, cocurricular, and extra-curricular activities, as well as support services to promote a smooth school-towork transition for students, based on the experience of the UST and its AIG partners;
- 2. Present perspectives of AAIG partners on successes and challenges in their participation in work-based learning initiatives during the COVID-19 pandemic; and
- 3. Develop recommendations on how educational institutions can establish and take advantage of strong AAIG partnerships to produce future-ready graduates.
