

Mass and Blessing for Thomasian Candidates in May 2022 Polls Celebrated



The USTAAI, through its Events Committee, organized a Eucharistic Celebration and Blessing for Thomasian candidates running for local and national posts in the 2022 national elections on March 17, 2022 at the Santissimo Rosario Parish or UST Chapel. The event that took place at 11am was organized to express the Thomasian alumni community's stand for clean, peaceful and honest elections. This was also livestreamed through the Facebook pages of the parish and the USTAAI so that candidates who could not be physically present could join in.

The Holy Mass was concelebrated, with parish priest Fr. Paul Talavera, OP as main celebrant, and UST Secretary General Fr. Louie Coronel, OP; CBCP Secretary General and ALPA president Monsignor Bernardo Pantin; and CBCP Assistant Secretary General Fr. Carlo del Rosario, who was the homilist.

In his homily, Fr. Carlo thanked God for gathering the Thomasian alumni community as one to celebrate the Eucharist and to pray for Thomasian candidates who have competence, commitment, and compassion. Drawing from the Gospel reading of Luke 16:19-31, he

talked about how we should love the poor and the lowly as the key to heaven. He said that as Thomasians, but specially for candidates running for local and national positions, we should have two qualities: "Dapat may PAKI-ALAM sa nangyayari sa paligid" (concern) and "may PAKIRAMDAM" (sensitivitity). He said that we are given many opportunities to create meaningful relationships with the "Lazarus" we find in our midst because these are the relationships that draw us out of our selfishness and give us life. He emphasized that our lack of concern and empathy for the poor around us will condemn us to hell. In closing, he addressed the candidates, "Kaisa at kasama ninyo kami, tulong-tulong tayo: alalahanin ang mga dukha, abutin ang mahihirap, l-angat natin ang antas ng buhay ng ating kapwa. Amen." ("We are one with you. Let us help one another in remembering the poor and reaching out to them, in uplifting their quality of life.")









CRS Celebrates Women's Month with Summit









The summit's first day focused on the rehabilitation assessment and interventions for pelvic pain, breast cancer, and lymphedema. The first speaker, Alreen Day Alfonso, PT, DPT, OCS, CIMT, CMTPT, CKTP, talked about pelvic pain assessment, treatment, and pelvic health in aging women. She discussed and demonstrated specific exercises that can help prevent pelvic dysfunction and improve overall pelvic health. This was followed by a discussion on breast cancer and lymphedema by Pam Paredes, PT, DPT, CLT-LANA. She also explained how to perform manual lymphatic drainage and demonstrated the bandaging technique.


The second day of the summit revolved on the movement approach to perinatal and postpartum care, physical and mental wellbeing of mothers during the







pandemic, and how to care for your child and oneself.
Anne Marieviel Olegario, PTRP, DOMTP, ERYT-500,
discussed some perinatal and postpartum exercises
that can be used in designing exercise programs for
pregnant women. She asked the participants to perform
some of these techniques in their own homes to get



a better feel of the exercises and to understand them. After this, Coach Alfa January Crisostomo provided several parenting tips that can help mothers care for their physical and mental health amid the pandemic. Lastly, Cecilia Anne Ibay, OTRP, talked about some mental health exercises and tips, such as the simple

appreciation of things that are commonly encountered in daily lives, yet which are sometimes ignored due to work and other concerns.

The summit, a success with 229 attendees, was granted 7 CPD units by the Professional Regulatory Commission—Continuing Professional Development (PRC-CPD) Council for Physical Therapy.

A Campus Memories &

At Seventeen

(50 years ago)

Not knowing exactly what course I wanted to take up after High School, my parents decided that the University of Santo Tomas was the ONLY school for me. The thought of going to the state university was definitely remote. My father called it "hub of Communism!"

So I did take the admission examination for Freshmen at the Faculty of Arts and Letters with the objective to graduate with an AB degree.

On the first day of class, I found myself in the company of friendly, wide-eyed, innocentlooking young men and women aged 16-17. All of us were in this awkward stage between childhood and adulthood.

Most of them introduced themselves as having graduated Valedictorian or Salutatorian or with honors. All I could have said, when asked what my credentials were, was that I have a Gold Loyalty Medal for studying at St. Theresa's College Manila and Quezon City for 12 years.

The class I got into was the special class, the Honors Class. It was made up of the 35 who topped the admission examination for freshmen, from over hundreds of examinees.

We all came from different schools of the different regions of the country and from different family backgrounds but we blended well with one another as we respected each other's uniqueness and idiosyncrasies.

Our class adviser was Ms. Perla Queyquep. She taught us Freshman English for two semesters. She encouraged us to come up with our very own class paper. And so, TRACES was born.

For the first semester, we also had Romy Abulad (Logic), Araceli Murillo (Alegebra), Fe Palafox (History of Europe) and Pedro Abella (Political Science). In the second semester, we had Cesar Martinez (Statistics), Magdalena Villaba-Cue (Dialectics), Vida Madrigal (History of Southeast Asia), Lourdes Bautista (Filipino Literature) and Corazon Cantos (World Geography). The time when Prof. Bautista took a temporary leave of absence, Prof. Milagros Tanlayco took over. She would bring her own chalk which had to be the same color as her outfit.

Our Dean was Rev. Fr. Dr. Frederik Fermin, formerly a Dutch diplomat. For years, the Faculty of Arts and Letters was the only college which had a Dominican priest for a dean. The others had priest Regents and lay persons as deans. Fr. Fermin and I would nurture a friendship that lasted for decades. We exchanged letters and from time to time, he would call to check on the family. He retired in Baguio (away from the 'chismis' as he would say) until he passed on in 2014. He was the second Filipino Rector of the University.

What we found odd in the Commerce Building was that there were separate staircases and canteens for the ladies and the gentlemen. This was to be strictly observed.

As Freshmen, we clearly observed the rules on uniforms. But as years went by, the ladies became bolder and bolder as their skirts became shorter and shorter. The men's tops became more colorful than the prescribed white! Men sported longer hair too!

By the second semester, we were still complete. We welcomed also OK Valeriano, who looked more mature than us and the three Vietnamese nuns, cross enrollees from the College of Education. We didn't know if we became holier with their presence or if they stayed on as nuns after this semester.

We also had a singing group named Trans Luv Energysts. Another feather to our cap was when we were chosen to represent the College in the intercollegiate singing competition, Expression '70 held on December 17, 1970. Even if we didn't win, it was indeed a very good experience. The good feeling of being pitted against the best groups in the University remained with us for a long time.

By the end of the school year, the nation was in crisis. Government debt was mounting, unemployment and prices continued to increase. Proclamation of martial law by President Marcos was becoming more and more imminent. Student unrest became more intense. Calls to boycott classes in the university became rampant.

In the following years, the A niners would become the writers, contributors, artists of the college paper FLAME and the university paper VARSITARIAN. Some were Council and club officers. Others excelled in singing, dancing, interpretative reading, and public speaking. I was blessed

to be chosen as Miss Arts and Letters in 1972 and one of UST's Five Outstanding Coeds in my Senior Year.

We have been successful in our chosen fields: media practitioners, book authors, lawyers, an engineer, artists, entrepreneurs, and civil servants. Most of us got married and became parents and now, grandparents for some.

So, 50 years after, here we are. Neither distance nor time weakened the bond we had with each other. We are thankful that social media has kept us even more connected. We get to "talk" to each other via Messenger and we hope we can all be connected with our other classmates of IA9.

We remember, too, our classmates who have gone ahead of us and all our beloved professors who have taught and nurtured us to become responsible citizens of this world. Even if they are no longer with us, still they are ever present in our memory and in our hearts.

I've always believed that nothing happens by accident. In that particular time frame, July 1970 to April 1971, when we were all a part of an academic experiment, God placed us to be with each other. Primarily, to be a part of each other's lives. Some came, as quiet as the gentle passing breeze; some like a thunderstorm with a bolt of lightning! Some remain in our memory for a long time; others do not. Each with a particular purpose according to God's divine plan.

It was a time of learning, of falling and getting back on our feet repeatedly, of losing, of caring and loving and growing up!

Rev. Fr. Pompeyo F. de Mesa, O.P., Up Close and Personal



Dedicating one's life to the Lord for is a great blessing. Rev. Fr. Pompeyo F. de Mesa, O.P. is the eldest of the six children of Cristino de Mesa, a Chinese mestizo and Adelina Francia, both from Guagua, Pampanga. His friends fondly call him Fr. Pompey or Fr. Pompeyo. I like to call him Fr. Pompeyo.

I met Fr. Pompeyo when he was the Director of the Institute of Religion a few decades ago when I was invited to speak on testing and evaluation to the faculty members of the Institute. I recall Fr. Pompeyo telling me about the grades he used to give to his students in a reflective tone. He has been teaching in the Ecclesistical Faculties.

Fr. Pompeyo spent his student life in Colegio de San Juan de Letran from 1938 to 1954, where he enjoyed the company of young boys like Rogelio Alarcon, now Fr. Rogelio Alarcon, O.P.. As a teen-ager, Pompeyo did not really aspire to become a priest. He wanted to be a doctor and follow the footsteps of his uncle – godfather, a well-known internist and cardiologist. The inspiration came to him when one afternoon, he said good-bye to Fr. Gregorio Raymundo, O.P. who reminded him that the Lord is calling on him. The good Friar told him that "Vocation is a calling" and advised him to answer the Lord. Whether it is a "yes" or a "no", Fr. Raymundo urged Pompeyo to answer the

The young Pompeyo walked home from Intramuros to Sampaloc, reflecting on the conversation he just had with Fr. Raymundo. When he reached home, his mother asked him how the day was. He looked at his mother and announced to her that he was going to Hong Kong. He did not hear any objection from his mother. But since their father just passed away, the young Pompeyo kept on thinking of

his mother and his five younger siblings. Being the eldest child, he knew he could help his mother take care of their family. But the inspiration was so strong that he did not vacillate anymore in his decision to join the Dominican Order.

Off he went to Hong Kong where he experienced the Dominican life of prayer, study, fellowship, and apostolate. Even today, he remembers vividly his formation in the Dominican house in Hong Kong where he completed his postulancy and novice life for five years. He finished his Licentiate and Lectoriate in Theology, Magna cum Laude.

In 1959, Fr. Pompeyo was sent to Rome to specialize on Scriptures and Liturgy at Atenaeum de Santi Anselmi, also known as Pontifical Athenaeum of Saint Anselm.

He also went to Germany where he learned how to speak the German language.

After years of being away from home, Fr. Pompeyo prepared for his return to the Philippines with joyful anticipation. The years that followed made Fr. Pompeyo occupied with big responsibilities.

He was appointed President of his alma mater, Colegio de San Juan de Letran in 1974 and remained in the same position until 1980.

From Letran, Fr. Pompeyo was assigned to the University of Santo Tomas, where he occupied administrative positions. He became the Director of the Institute of Religion and was later assigned as Regent in different colleges and faculties. Today, he is the Regent of the Faculty of Pharmacy.

Fr. Pompeyo is one priest who is quick to say yes when invited to say mass, to bless, to hear confession, or even just to socialize. It makes one feel good to know that he is always ready to do his priestly mission whenever his schedule permits and whoever is inviting him. He seriously takes to heart the assignments given to him in the University.

As the Ecclesiastical Adviser of the USTAAI, he has helped the Association in making important decisions particularly as member of the Selection Committee for the The Outstanding Thomasian Alumni (TOTAL) Awards, and the Dispute Resolution Commission. He is always straightforward when giving his advice and suggestions.

Behind the seemingly aloof bearing of Fr. Pompeyo is a caring person and a loyal friend. Despite his being away from his family

since he became a novice in the Dominican Order, he closely relates with the members of his family specially his orphaned nephews and nieces. Knowing Fr. Pompeyo for many years now, I can say that it is fun listening to his stories as a young boy in Letran, as a young seminarian, and as a priest. From his stories, one can see a joyful heart; a heart that has absolutely loved the Lord and has faithfully dedicated itself to Him.

Indeed, Fr. Pompeyo answered the calling of the Lord. He said yes and remained faithful to his covenant with Him.
