Sy Grandballroom of the Buenaventura Garcia Paredes, O.P. Building, España, Manila.

Service to the Church

Among the TOTAL Awards 2022 awardees is the Manila Archbishop Jose Cardinal Advincula for the category Service to the Church. Before his appointment, he has been known for his pastoral programs reaching out to communities and establishing mission stations and schools in far-flung areas

in the country especially in the diocese of San Carlos and Capiz.

Service to Humanity

After being conferred as the Thomasian Young Achiever of TOTAL Awards 2008, Arts and Letters alumnus Jeffrey Tarayao continues to excel in managing corporate social responsibility and corporate foundations. His role as the Chief Corporate Social Responsibility Office of the Manila Electric Company (Meralco) and the President of One Meralco Foundation paved the way for the expansion of Meralco's community electrification program that served thousands of low-income households and remote public schools across the country.

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FLORES DE MAYO 2022 HELD

The USTAAL, through its Events Committee, organized the traditional Flores de Mayo 2022 at the Santisimo Rosario Parish last May 28, 2022, in partnership with the Office of the Vice-Rector for Religious Affairs. Different alumni associations honored the Blessed Virgin Mother with the recitation of the Holy

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USTAAL KICKS OFF ITS AAIG 2022 CARAVAN SERIES

The resounding success of the Academe, Alumni, and Government (AAIG) summits in 2019 and 2021 inspired the University of Santo Tomas Alumni Association, Inc. (USTAAL) to run AAIG 2022 Caravan Series to cascade the learning of the summits. In partnership with the UST Graduate School Center for Continuing Professional Education and Development (UST GS CCPED), the Caravan Series is the online echo webinar of the AAIG 2021 National Multisectoral Summit for Educational Transformation: An Academe – Alumni – Industry – Government Collaboration held in September and October. The main aim of the learning series is to stimulate the emergence of AAIG advocates, champions and a community of practitioners (COP) through a collaborative effort among the alumni, government agencies, higher education institutions, and industry. It is a concrete attempt to share the insights of AAIG 2021 to key stakeholders in five different strategic areas around the country, namely: NCR, Calabarzon, Cordillera Administrative Region (CAR), Visayas, and Mindanao.

The Maiden Caravan which served as the pilot run for the Caravan Series was held on April 21, 2022. With over 100 participants in attendance, the program started with Dr. Fe Hidalgo, Former OIC

Secretary/Undersecretary of the Department of Education, giving the opening remarks with the topic "Coming Together to Create Inclusive Success." This was followed by a perspective sharing and clarion call given by Ms. Rosanna Urdaneta, Deputy Director General for Policies & Planning of the Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA), and by Dr. Michael Anthony Vasco, Dean of the UST Graduate School. The AAIG main convener and USTAAI Chairman of the Board Henry Tenedero served as the host of the event and facilitated the plenary discussion among the

participants. To recognize the important role of the participants in the success of the Caravan Series, USTAAI President Dr. Evelyn Songco led the recommitment to the Manifestation of Solidarity. The closing remarks was given by Associate Professor Jocelyn F. Agcaoili, MHPED, MSPT, Director of the UST GS CCPED.

Prior to this event, five Higher Education Institutions (HEI) were identified to be the partner institutions that would serve as the local convener and host in their respective regions. Fully aware of these institutions' commitment to quality education and

inclusive growth and development, USTAAI is confident that they can influence the emergence of a community of practitioners and will best serve as the AAIG champions in their region. The HEIs are as follows: University of Santo Tomas (NCR), First Asia Institute of Technology and Humanities Colleges (Region IV-A / Calabarzon), Don Mariano Marcos Memorial State University (Region 1 / Cordillera Administrative Region), and Silliman University (Visayas). For Mindanao, both Davao del Norte State College and Western Mindanao State University will share duties as the local conveners.

The AAIG 2022 Caravan for NCR is scheduled on July 13, 2022, with the UST Office of the Vice Rector for Academic Affairs hosting the event. Prof. Cheryl Ramos Peralta, DrPH, PTRP, Vice Rector for Academic Affairs will take the lead as the AAIG champion for NCR. The UST Educational Technology Center (EdTech) will livestream the event on both the USTAAI and GS CCPED Facebook pages. The succeeding Caravans are scheduled in August and September. Arts and Humanities

Another TOTAL awardee is communications and journalism scholar Dr. Crispin Maslog for the category of Media and Entertainment. The Philosophy and Letters alumnus has authored 39 books and became the director of Silliman University's School of Journalism and Communication. He served as a professor at UP Los Baños and produced generations of journalists throughout his teaching career.

Painter and sculptor Nemesio Miranda, Jr. was conferred the TOTAL Award for Music, Arts, Literature and Design. Known as the Father of Imaginative Figurism, the Fine Arts alumnus has been considered as an influential art leader in his hometown, Angono Rizal. Recently, he was nominated for the National Artists Award administered by the National Commission for the Arts and Cultural Center of the Philippines.

Business and Management

In the category of Accounting, Business, and Management, two graduates stood out in their respective fields of expertise among the nominees in this year's TOTAL Awards. UST High School alumnus DTI Sec. Ramon Lopez is this year's TOTAL Awardee for Management while Wilcon Depot founder and chairman emeritus Engr. William T. Belo is the TOTAL Awardee for Business.

Sec. Lopez's solid professional economic, trade & industry development career focused on the development of MSME sector and advocated for the empowerment of youth, aspiring entrepreneurs and underprivileged sectors. He has worked on major reforms for stronger investment inflows in the country such

as the Ease of Doing Business, Corporate Recovery and Tax Incentives for Enterprises to name a few.

Wilcon Depot patriarch Engr. Belo has built a brand trusted by many industry professionals, home enthusiasts and homeowners nationwide. His socio-civic institution named Wilcon Foundation has provided education assistance to underprivileged children and aide to victims of calamities.

Law and Justice

Another TOTAL Awardee is UST Faculty of Civil Law incumbent dean Atty. Nilo Divina for the category of Law and Justice. With decades of corporate and banking law experience, Atty. Divina continues to contribute to the legal community through publications of books on Commercial Law and articles for his column at the Daily Tribune. His firm, Divina Law, has become one of the country's biggest law firm with a wide clientele base.

Medicine and Science

Three Thomasian doctors have joined the list of this year's TOTAL Awards.

Makati Medical Center Medical Director Dr. Saturnino Javier was awarded for the category of Health Allied. As an interventional cardiologist, he devoted his time to continuing medical education through lectures and conferences. His commitment made him an active participant in improving the status of medical practice and education in the country.



In the field of Science and Technology, nephrologist Dr. Edgar Lerma is the TOTAL Awardee for this category. The Chicago-based doctor is also a clinical professor at the University of Illinois. He has published 26 books and authored more than 100 peer-reviewed publications about chronic kidney disease, hypertension, bone and mineral disorders.

The 2022 TOTAL Awardee for Medicine is Dr. Maria Minerva Calimag. The full-blooded Thomasian doctor is a practicing anesthesiologist, professor, and researcher. She held many positions in different medical groups, and travelled around the world to conduct research and present papers to fellow scholars and doctors. Recently, she was awarded as Metrobank Foundation Outstanding Filipino Teacher in Higher Education.

THE DISTINGUISHED: ALL THOMASIAN ATELIER EXHIBITION



Not just a showcase of exceptional skills and celebration of creative intellects, The Distinguished is also an exposition of talents of different generations who gathered and gave back to their Alma Mater, the University of Santo Tomas (UST).

These Thomasian master artists are Angelito Antonio, Antonio Austria, Tam Austria, Andres Barrioquinto, Rosario Bitanga, Remy Boquiren, Joe Datuin, Fil dela Cruz, India dela Cruz, Anita del Rosario, Edgar Doctor, Jess Flores, Raul Isidro, Willy Layug, Derrick Macutay, Nemi Miranda, Justin Nuyda, and Ramon Orlina.

These artists are not only objectively extraordinary, but are importantly influential in the art community, be it painting, printmaking, or sculpture as their mode of expression, and in terms of style doing figurative, or being nonrepresentational. More so, their rise to fame is a testament of their passion to sustain their relevance in the art community; their successes serve as inspiration to many.

The process of selecting the roster of illustrious and celebrated artists started in 2018 and ended in 2022. It has undergone stringent screening of a Committee from the University, and those chosen are deemed worthy to be an honoree of the Distinguished Thomasian Alumni Award. The noble endeavor is on the progression of the art and design industry in the country and beyond to create a blueprint for everyone with the same passion to follow.

To write only a fraction of the numerous contributions and accomplishments of this magnificent roster is indeed insufficient.



Nevertheless, the exhibition invites viewers to appreciate, study, reflect on and find meaning in the metaphors and the natures imbued into these masterpieces.

Education and learning are easily accessible nowadays while advancement in technology can be contributory to success from which one can claim, "Am I much better than them?" For Abe Orobia, an artist, educator, and curator of this exhibition, he can say that this assertion could be both fair and unkind because one thing we cannot deduct from these bestowed artists: their distinct discipline, hard work, dedication, and determination.

As the art world is continuously evolving, innovating, and becoming competitive, it becomes a marathon of sorts; but values should remain. These intangibles are engraved and reflected in the works of these masters that are worth emulating as they are testaments and yardsticks of longevity and success in the industry.

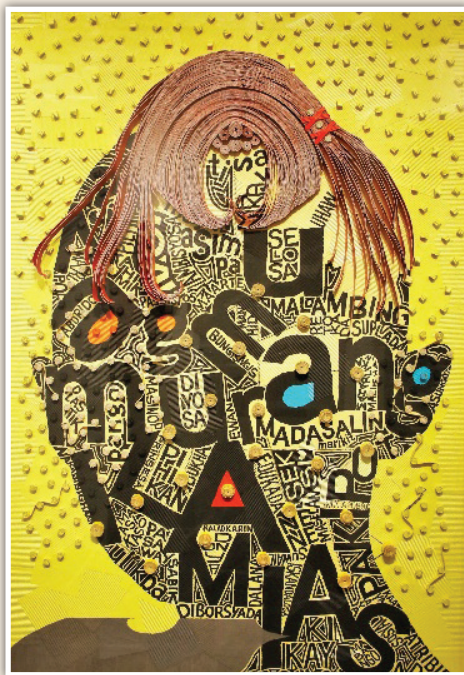
Prejudice is dangerous and unforgiving, and this is what Elmer Dumlaog wants us to reflect on in his Kamukhamo series: to be more sensible, fair, cautious, and discerning yet critically caring.

His work entitled, *Kamukhamo: Nagmumurang Kamias* is an allegory for a person of elderly yet behaves and dresses like a youngster. This work greatly implies our conservative nature towards social norms.

Dumlaog's central piece *Kamukhamo: Salamin* is an interactive work of multiple mirrors installed on canvas where spectators

can view themselves to their gusto, while reading scribbled positive attributes of which one or two more aspects they might wish to possess. We love to be loved, and this piece is what this is all about. It is a moral anecdote on why we tend to criticize even though we do not want to be put in the same situation.

Dumlao's *Kamukhamo: Doble Kara* means but not focuses on what *doble kara* means but on the materials he extracted to add further depth and meaning to his work. The "sakla" card game which composes the portrait signifies how we are viewed differently by people we meet. It is said that people fear what they cannot understand (or they cannot be understood by people around them), and true enough, this infects us all for we rather are perceived as fearful than brave since decisions are not simply black and white or a choice of good versus evil all the time.

Dumlao as an artist does not judge. On the other hand, he considers himself a spectator and an observer of human interactions. He believes these interactions are neither right nor wrong. They are situational and are simply conditions to be separated, to be different, and to feel great about."

Kamukhamo: Face the Truth, Truth Is in Your Face is the 12th solo exhibition of Dumlao and was on view from May 15 to 28. - *Abe Orobio, BFA, BS Fine Arts, Painting, 2005*

THREE ATELIER ALUMNI RECEIVE HIGHEST HONORS



It's only midway 2022 and already, three Atelier alumni have received highest honors from different institutions in their respective fields.

The Slim effect

Decades of continuous innovation, creativity, and inspiration in the fashion world led Salvacion Lim-Higgins to be the recipient of 2022's National Artist for Design. Popularly known as Slim in the fashion industry, Higgins is a renowned international designer. A contemporary of Christian Dior famed for the "New Look" and Cristobal Balenciaga, she launched her career in 1947, an era which, until 1957 was lauded as the Golden Age of Haute Couture and the Golden Age of Philippine Fashion. Slim is well-known for innovating the *terno* and introducing it for the global audience.

Her famous works worn by royalty are housed at several museums abroad and featured in movies. This is proof that she cemented her career as the queen and pioneer of Philippine fashion design. Her works are ahead of her time, described as wearable art and highly regarded for its contemporary feel.

Heralded as an advocate of culture, she designed costumes for the Bayanihan Dance Company from the 1960s to 1970s, an endeavor that was seen globally since the dance group travelled across Asia, Europe, Middle East, and the Americas. Since her passing in 1990, numerous fashion shows have been held as a tribute. The National Artist award is the highest honor given by the Philippine president in the creative field. Along with Lim-Higgins, the list of national artists proclaimed this year included Nora Aunor (film), Tony Mabesa (theater), Ricky



Lee (film), Marilou Diaz-Abaya (film), Fides Cuyugan-Asencio (music), and Geminio Abad (literature).

Nemesio Miranda, a revered muralist, sculptor, and multi-awarded visual artist, is the 2022 recipient of UST's TOTAL (The Outstanding Thomasian Alumni) Awards for Music, Arts, Literature and Design. Nemiranda, as he is fondly called, has a long-standing career in the art industry. He created not just paintings on various projects but designed stamps as well for the Philippine Post Office, and erected several murals throughout the country, the latest, in Leyte Capitol. The mural is about the Leyte landing of Gen. Douglas Mac Arthur and his own interpretation of the map of the province in the shape of the crucified Christ.

Nemiranda has participated in over 100 exhibitions here and abroad. As the founder of the Angono Ateliers Association in 1975, he continuously promotes on the promotion of the Gigantes Festival in Angono, Rizal. To promote art and culture in his hometown, he turned his studio into the Nemiranda Family Art Museum and Café which is a famous tourist destination. He also institutionalized the Angono Atelier where he is training aspiring youth to become professional visual artists.

PHILIPPINE INDEPENDENCE DAY IN TAMPA, FLORIDA

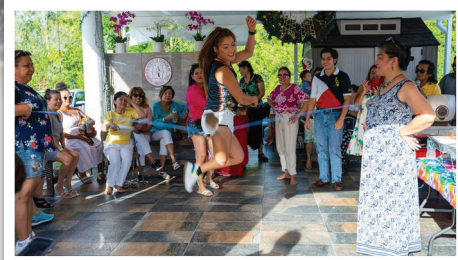


Sunday, June 12, 2022 - Tampa, Florida. Filipinos celebrated their Philippine Independence Day with an open-to-all picnic organized by the *Ang Bisaya of Florida* (ABF), one of the member organizations of the Philippine Cultural Foundation, Inc. of Tampa. The picnic was held at the *Ang Bisaya of Florida Pavilion* inside the Philippine Enrichment Complex owned by the Philippine community in the greater Tampa Bay area, where the annual 3-day Philippine festival called "PhilFest" was also held.

Having been one of the original dancers of the UST Salinggawi when it was founded in 1967, right after my graduation at UST in 1970 with a bachelor's degree in fine arts major in Advertising, this writer immediately joined the Bayanihan Dance Company, the pride of the Philippines.

I travelled the world for seven years and eventually settled in Düsseldorf, Germany where I learned my German, the language of my mother. Then, I was employed by one of the richest men in the world, the Baron Arndt Krupp of Germany married to HSH Princess Henriette of Austria. I was their Aide de Camp and was later promoted to the title of Lord Chamberlain. Eight years of living in castles and travelling in private yachts and planes, meeting royalty and celebrities, when the Baron died of cancer. I then decided to join my family in America and settled in Tampa, Florida where I built a house for my parents.

A few years later, I met some Filipinos in Tampa, formed a Philippine dance company, and eventually became one of the founding board members of the Philippine



Cultural Foundation, Inc. (PCFI). I was able to purchase a 10-acre property which we call the Philippine Enrichment Complex. A few years later, we built the Bayanihan Arts and Events Center, truly a one of a kind facility in America.

After being the first Chairman of the Board of PCFI, I stepped down and took the title of Director of Cultural Affairs. My job was to coordinate the 21-member Filipino organization under the foundation with all their events, plan all our annual events a year before, produce cultural exhibits, shows, competitions, including Philippine Independence Day celebrations.

Despite the summer heat, more than three hundred Filipinos from different provinces in the Philippines attended the event. There were adults and teenagers, as well as kids as young as 4 years old, all eager to celebrate our Independence Day here, away from our motherland.

Not like many Filipino organizations in America which celebrate our independence with a grand formal ball or a fiesta type celebration, Tampa decided to make it simple and entertaining this year. Guests gave very interesting storytelling topics to the enjoyment of everybody, particularly the Filipino American youth who were born in America. Stories about the Filipino's fight for freedom, and much more were told. I gave



a brief history about the Philippines as well as the evolution of our Philippine flag. There was even a sharing of Philippine legends like the "Legend of the Pineapple" (*Alamat ng Piña*) that was beautifully and comically enjoyed by all!

But what caught the attention of the young ones in attendance was when members of the organizing committee, the *Ang Bisaya of Florida* took turns introducing and explaining different Filipino games, like *sungka*, *sipa*, *patintero*, *tumba lata*, and even *siatong*, just to mention a few. American guests and Filipino-American kids were delighted to learn such new games they never heard before.

After a sumptuous merienda-lunch prepared by the organization, it was time to play all the games the guests had just learned.

Overall, simple as it may have been, the celebration of our Philippine Independence Day was educational, informative, memorable, and fun. Thanks to the *Ang Bisaya of Florida* which organized this year's event and to the Philippine Cultural Foundation, Inc. of Tampa for always allowing all the Philippine organizations to continue promoting and preserving our Philippine cultures and traditions here in America for generations to come. - *Jose Omila - 1970*

Growing in and with UST

Antonio L. Fernandez, Chemical Engineering 1975

Remiscing about UST ultimately draws me to think in terms of my career and much more.

I practically grew up in UST. With a gold loyalty medal to boot, I graduated with a chemical engineering degree in 1975, 15 years after I first entered the university gates. My world expanded as I started attending elementary school. Even now, I could imagine being in that old one-story wooden school building where a parking building now stands.

In the countless times I have been at the campus, I have witnessed its transformation over the years. Particularly, the Plaza Mayor, in its broad sweep, impresses me every time I draw close to the Main Building, a place I frequented before security became an issue.

I would go up the wide wooden staircase inside the Main Building to the musty museum. There, I marveled at the displays - old coins, preserved animals, large paintings, religious images to no end. At this day and age, it would probably be comparable to being in a Harry Potter movie. The UST Chapel was another place I would go to often. Though not a parishioner, I was a Legion of Mary member in the parish. High school memories included sitting under a shady acacia tree and enjoying the peace despite the noise in España Street after the weekly Saturday afternoon meeting.

I have probably explored every nook and corner of the campus except those areas which have now become part of the built-up area of the 25-ha. campus. With the research centers, certain areas that used to be "off limits" are now accessible. That was exactly my thought when I joined the Graduate School as lecturer and became a member of the UK-funded Newton Project research team in 2017.

The team, comprised of teachers and students from the faculties of architecture, arts and sciences, was engaged in a three-year



joint project with the University of Reading (UoR), UK. The research was on mapping eco-social assets in Santa Rosa City, where another UST campus is now rising. It was an exciting engagement which led to another important development in my career - becoming an adviser of a student in the dual PhD Architecture/Built Environment program - also with the UoR.

I am honored to be part of the faculty of the Graduate School and a participant in what might be considered a milestone in the university's academic history.

Through these involvements, I have seen the openness of the university towards advances in transformative learning which is what our country needs. Also, a certain degree of boldness to adapt to global changes is imperative. Encouraging trans-disciplinary research is one of these.

My training as a chemical engineer had done me well through changes in my career. In my five college years, I received the solid foundation I needed, thanks to my excellent teachers. Before graduation, I received an offer

to teach. Though I liked the idea of sharing knowledge, I declined because I wanted to get experience in industry, and I did.

Not long after, I became more environmentally aware as pollution became worse. Eventually, I pursued a master of engineering degree in environmental engineering at Osaka University with a Japanese government scholarship. There, I met my wife, Ana Marie 'Nanette' Ochoa (Education '76) who also was on scholarship. Months after our return in 1981, we got married in December.

Was it the 'red thread' of destiny, as the Japanese would say? It must be God's plan that we, both Thomasians, would meet in Japan. We could have met in campus; after all, the Education and Engineering buildings were beside each other.

I believe our faith and UST years also melded us together. She knows a few teachers during my high school years between 1966 and 1970 since she taught at UST High School after graduation.

Every time I walk past the new USTHS and the all too familiar edifices on my way to the Thomas Aquinas Research Center, I feel a sense of pride swelling within me. I gaze up the Main Building and see the theologians, historians and philosophers on either side of the Tria Haec (of faith, hope and love), the comedians and tragedians facing Padre Noval, and the playwrights facing Gov. Forbes now Lacson. Yes, I knew who those statues were as an engineering student who joined university quiz shows.

There were not many extracurricular activities after martial law was declared. I sought to develop my writing skills as I became part of the Thomasian Engineer board of editors, and pursued Christian formation as a member of Pax Romana (PR). I learned much later that Nanette was the Education PR President and that she was the Education Journal editor-in-chief. We could have met at UST but we had to meet in Japan! Indeed, gratitude fills my heart as I write these recollections.
