



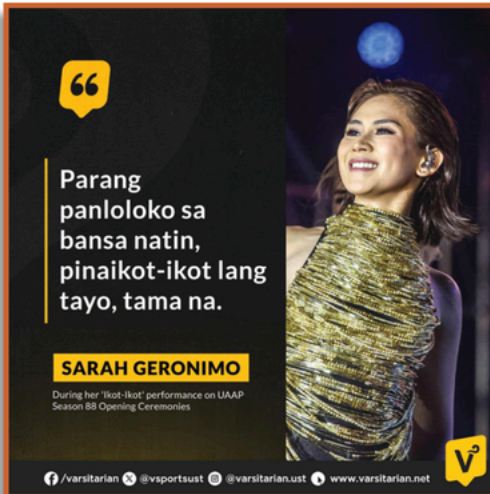

The University of Santo Tomas (UST) opened UAAP Season 88 with a grand and emotional ceremony that paid tribute to its illustrious alumni, as Thomasian icons from different generations led the torch relay, cauldron lighting, and various performances at the UST Grandstand on Friday night, 19 September 2025.

Award-winning actor and proud Thomasian Piolo Pascual set the mood for this season's remarkable Opening Ceremony, taking charge as the spotlight falls on UST in a pre-recorded clip featuring the athletes of participating schools.

This year's torch relay draws inspiration from the Olympic torch relays, which symbolize hope, peace, friendship and tolerance. The flame of hope, handed over at the university's iconic landmarks, was carried by four exceptional Thomasian athletes. Cherry Ann "Sisi" Rondina, a four-time UAAP beach volleyball MVP and a member of the Philippine women's volleyball team, led the torch relay from the Arch of the Centuries. The torch was then handed over at the historic main building to Jervy Cruz, a UAAP MVP and a four-time champion in the PBA who currently plays for the Basilan

Viva Portmasters under the Maharika Pilipinas Basketball League. At the Quattromondial Monument, Sydney Sy ran the next segment of the torch relay. She is one of UST's best judokas, earning the title of "Asian Sambo Queen," and is now the chairperson of the International Sambo Federation Athletes Commission.

Two-time Olympian and Thomasian pole vault star Ernest John "EJ" Obiena took center stage in the last leg of the relay and lit the UAAP cauldron which represents the dreams and aspirations of all participating athletes and unites them in the spirit of sportsmanship and hope.

From the UST Grandstand, with the lights lit and the cheers echoing, Very Rev. Fr. Richard G. Ang, O.P., Rector Magnificus of the University of Santo Tomas and UAAP Season 88 Chairman,

individuals, the sanctuary began to rise, and God's providence was deeply felt. In gratitude to God and the community, Caleruega launched programs aimed at holistic growth and development. One of its most impactful initiatives is the annual Medical, Surgical and Dental Mission, organized in partnership with the UST Alumni Association Inc., the mother organization of all recognized University of Santo Tomas alumni associations.

The first mission was held on 30 July 2023, serving 188 indigent patients from Barangay Kaylaway, Nasugbu, Batangas. The second mission, held on 23 June 2024, expanded its reach to nearby barangays and served 359 patients. On its third year, the mission was held on 7 September 2025, despite inclement weather that postponed its original schedule. The event coincided with the eve of the Blessed Virgin Mary's

PROJECT EMONG: **GIVING COMPASSIONATE SERVICE**

The UST Golden Cross and Saber Alumni Association, Inc. (GCSAAI), the alumni association of UST Advance ROTC graduates, heeded the call of a distressed brother, Fr. Glenn Nino of UST ROTC Class '87, to provide relief efforts for his affected flock in Barangays Cabungan and San Jose in Anda, Pangasinan. A state of calamity was declared over Pangasinan after a series of typhoons ravaged the province.

Humanitarian aid and relief efforts held on 16 August 2025 was a collaborative effort among the UST GCSAAI, Operation Brotherhood Community Foundation, The Medical City (TMC) Pangasinan, the Philippine Coast Guard and Phil. Coast Guard Auxiliary 109th Squadron. The mission was able to provide care packages for 200 families. Each family care package contained 2 kilos of rice, 4 canned goods, 6 pieces instant noodles, 4 pieces instant coffee, 4 pieces powdered



milk, one pack of biscuits, pre-loved shirt, jacket and hygiene kit with a sachet of shampoo, bath soap, feminine care pads, wet wipes, toothpaste, toothbrush and cotton buds. Medicines for maintenance and common illnesses were provided by TMC Pangasinan led by Past National Commander, Dr. Rory Tuazon of UST ROTC Class '85. He is currently the Chief Medical Officer of TMC Pangasinan.

The mission was fuelled by the passion and generous support of the UST GCC International led by Manny Amolat '73, Michael Mora CL '82,

UST High School Alumni Alliance Elects New Chairman and President in Historic General Council Assembly



Despite the steady downpour outside, a spirit of unity and optimism filled the halls of the UST Thomasian Alumni Center on Saturday, 19 July 2025. Alumni representatives from Batch 1975 to 2000 gathered for the much-anticipated General Council Assembly and Election of New Chairman and President of the UST High School Alumni Alliance, Inc. (USTHSAAI).

Held from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM at the 3rd floor of the BGPOP Building inside the UST Main Campus, the meeting successfully convened a majority quorum, with 14 out of 26 recognized Batch Representatives present, representing the classes of 1976, 1977, 1979, 1980–1989, and 1991.

The assembly was officially opened by Lito Malabanan of Batch 1977, the outgoing Chairman of the Board. In his opening message, Mr. Malabanan moved for a significant structural change: to expand the Board of Trustees to include

all members of the General Council, each representing their respective batches. The proposal was seconded, discussed and unanimously approved by all attendees, thus marking a new era of broader participation and shared leadership.

With this historic decision, the following alumni officially took their Oath of Office as the new Board of Trustees of USTHSAAI: 1976 - Henry Joseph Herrera; 1977- Manny L. Estrada; 1979 - Bien Mendoza; 1980 - Rosa Marina "Ina" Valenzuela; 1981 - Avic Balagtas Bartilad; 1982 - Ronnie Gomez; 1983 - Greg Mota; 1984 - Ma. Agnes P. Julian; 1985 - Alvin; Justiniani; 1986 - Marlon Gregory M. Pena; 1987-Rogelio B. Tapang; 1988 - Allan Colico; 1989 - Ruth Felipe; and 1991- Simon Sotacio.

As its first order of business, the newly seated Board unanimously elected Ronnie Gomez of Batch 1982 as the new Chairman. Mr. Gomez, the outgoing President of the Executive Officers, was sworn into office by Mr. Malabanan in a warm and symbolic passing of the torch.

Chairman Gomez then facilitated the election of the new President of the USTHSAAI, resulting in a clear majority win for Alvin Justiniani of Batch 1985, who received 13 out of 14 votes. One

vote was cast for Ms. Ruth Felipe of Batch 1989.

In accordance with the USTHSAAI By-Laws, President Justiniani was given the authority to appoint his Executive Team. He announced the following appointments, which were warmly received by the Board: Vice President - Avic Balagtas-Bartilad (Batch 1981); Secretary- Rogelio Tapang (Batch 1987); and Treasurer - Ma. Agnes Julian (Batch 1984). The new set of officers were formally sworn into office by Chairman Gomez, concluding the day's official agenda with a renewed sense of purpose and solidarity.

The USTHSAAI now looks forward to three exciting years of growth, activity, and stronger alumni engagement under the dynamic leadership of Chairman Gomez and President Justiniani

Thomasians Unite For Relief Efforts - Tomasino Para sa Kapwa Pilipino!

Following the onslaught of typhoons Crising, Dante and Emong in July 2025, the Thomasian Alumni Community Foundation, Inc. (TACFI) and the UST Alumni Association, Inc. (USTAAI), together with the UST Thomasian Alumni Leaders Association (UST TALA), conducted a disaster relief and rehabilitation operations through the Tomasino Para sa Kapwa Pilipino to support affected communities in Metro Manila. These efforts involved distributing essential goods like food packs, hygiene and household kits, and offered financial assistance for home repairs.

USTAAI Advocacy Chairperson Angie Tuazon led the relief operations on 23 July at the National Shrine of Our Lady of the Holy Rosary of La Naval de Manila (Sto. Domingo Church), in coordination with its Parish Priest Rev. Fr. Simon Peter Ramos, OP. Barangay admin RJ Bituin Raymond and Kagawad Ariel Rosales helped facilitate and organize the evacuees at Diosdado Macapagal Elementary School in Brgy. Tatalon, Quezon City, where the residents experienced extreme flooding that reached their roofs due to Typhoon Crising. A total of 5,552 individuals and 1,442 families received relief packs, hot meals, bread, and bucket stool organizers for their use, thanks to the generous donations from Bien Enrico Ah, Manix and Sarah Chua, Cha and Sweet Tanedo, Sally and Wilson Neria, Gina Almario, Mitsui Trading Phils and also the Rotaract Club of Chinatown who provided logistics support.

On 26 July, another relief operation was conducted in Navotas and Malabon, offering essential supplies and

assisting hundreds of families affected by the severe flooding in the area. At San Lorenzo Ruiz and Companion Martyrs Parish Church in Navotas, through the coordination with its parish priest, Rev. Fr. Allan V. Lopez, O.P., a total of 200 families received donations in the form of bucket stools, bread, and water. The volunteers also headed to the Our Lady of Peace Chapel Mission Station at Letre, Tonsuya in Malabon City, where another 200 relief packs were distributed, through the assistance of local volunteers and the mission station priest from Guatemala, Rev. Fr. Luis E. Duarte. This particular mission highlighted the collaborative efforts of the whole Thomasian alumni community, with the member alumni associations UST Golden Cross and Saber Alumni Association, Inc., and the UST AMV Accountancy Alumni Association, Inc. joining the relief operations. This activity was made possible through donations from Megaforce Securities, Jenn Sobremonte, Carlos Lemi, Marilyn Ngo, Sarah Chua, Sally Neria, and the UST AMV Accountancy Alumni Association, Inc. USTAAI and UST TALA officers Ces San Juan and John Peran led the group of volunteers which included the UST Golden Cross and Saber Alumni Association, Inc.'s National Commander, AUX Rear Admiral Jomar de la Peña, members of the UST ROTC Unit Sgt. Jemimah B. David PA (Res), C/CPT Iosef Pio E. Delos Reyes, and Cadet Officer Ryan Andrew Laguardo and the UST AMV Accountancy Alumni Association, Inc. president John Derick De Recto, who was joined by Jorge Punzalan.

On 28 July, USTAAI, TACFI, and UST TALA collaborated with the UST

Simbahayan Community Development Office's TULONG TOMASINO and the Office of the Vice-Rector for Religious Affairs and the UST Central Student Council, providing relief support to the San Andres Mission Station for the flood victims in Tangos, which is part of the Diocese of Kaloocan. Rev. Fr. Allan Lopez, OP, Director of Caritas Kaloocan, helped facilitate this effort at the Tangos Mission Station in Dagat Dagatan, Navotas and delivered ready-to-eat canned goods, noodles, rice, mineral water, toiletries and alcohol, sanitary pads/napkins, and school supplies to the affected community. Additional supplies were also sent to the San Lorenzo Ruiz and Companion Martyrs Parish, this time, for the EJK Typhoon victims in Navotas.

The following day, again with the help of Rev. Fr. Allan Lopez and volunteers from San Lorenzo Ruiz and Companion Martyrs Parish, relief goods were distributed at Pitong Gatang Mission Station in Navotas with donations coming from Bella Lee, Jose and Angie Tuazon, Carlos Lemi, Myrabel Concepcion, Christopher Ong and all their families.

The Tomasino Para sa Kapwa Pilipino program is an integral part of TACFI, USTAAI, and UST TALA's advocacy, delivering urgent and essential aid to individuals affected by emergencies and natural disasters. This includes the provision of food, water, and medical care, and is instrumental in quickly raising the required funds while enabling member alumni associations to coordinate the deployment of volunteers at a moment's notice.

Project First One Thousand Days in Caleruega

The first one thousand days of life, from conception to a child's second birthday, is a critical window for growth and development. Proper nutrition and healthcare during this period establish the foundation for lifelong health, learning and well-being.

Believing in this principle, USTAAI's Project First One Thousand Days participated in the Medical Mission held in Caleruega, Batangas on 7 September 2025. Fr. Jeff Aytona, medical mission coordinator, provided the team with a spacious venue called Gazekubo. Team of volunteers, including physicians, attended to the children from 8:30 AM to 1 PM.

The team was composed of volunteers from TALA, Pax Romana Alumni Association (PRAA), College of Education Alumni Foundation Inc. (CEAFI) and Alpha Phi Omega Alumni Association (APOPI). The core group provided nutrition and health services to children and to support families in adopting sustainable practices for improved child growth and development. A total of 75 children benefited from this initiative.

Throughout the day, the four PRAA

physicians assessed the nutritional and developmental status of the children, provided healthcare services for medical concerns and guidance for follow-up care. The parents were also advised to follow up with Rural Health Units, Health Centers, or Regional Hospitals for immunizations and management of chronic illnesses.

The CEAFI nutritionists and dieticians, on the other hand, conducted nutrition counseling with emphasis on breastfeeding and minimum dietary diversity. The children were provided with micronutrient supplements, including multivitamin drops to address common deficiencies and to strengthen immunity.

For this program, all 75 children underwent weight and length/height measurements for profiling and data gathering. The results were explained to parents as part of anticipatory guidance, helping them understand growth patterns to address concerns early.

A nutritious meal of rice porridge was served to all children and families. As part of the nutritional counselling, a sample one-week menu (based on WHO/UNICEF/FNRI 2023 guidelines)

were distributed, ensuring a practical tool for households to meet the minimum dietary diversity of four food groups per meal or per day.

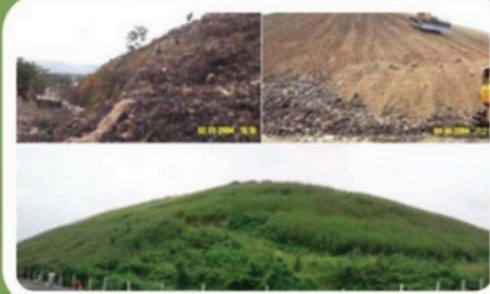

birthday and the canonization of St. Carlo Acutis and St. Pier Giorgio Frassati OP, whose intercessions were sought for favorable weather.

The mission began at 8:00 a.m. with a well-organized pre-registration led by Barangay Health Workers. A total of 432 beneficiaries received services across 13 medical specialties, namely:

- **Internal Medicine: 38**
- **Family Medicine: 34**
- **Endocrinology: 3**
- **Surgical Circumcision: 8**
- **Minor Surgery: 14**
- **Dermatology: 30**
- **ENT: 20**
- **OB-Gynecology: 18**
- **OB-Gyne Ultrasound Census: 19**
- **Pediatrics: 72**
- **Ophthalmology: 61**
- **Dental Extraction: 98**
- **Dental Fluoride Treatment: 17**

This year's mission also launched the First 1,000 Days Advocacy Program of the USTAAI, headed by Visitacion Asiddao. The program focuses on supporting mothers and infants during the critical early stages of development

to prevent stunting and promote holistic growth. Dietitians, pediatricians, OB-GYN specialists, and volunteers provided essential care and guidance to families.

The joy seen on the faces of those

served made the mission deeply rewarding. Caleruega's 30th Foundation Anniversary and Jubilee of Hope was celebrated not just with festivities, but with meaningful service to the community.

UST Alumni Journey Through Manila's Jubilee Churches

Last 21 August 2025, UST alumni embarked on a meaningful Pilgrimage of Hope to seven Jubilee Churches in the Archdiocese of Manila. The spiritual journey was organized by the UST Pax Romana Alumni Association, Inc. (PRAAI), marking the fifth Jubilee Pilgrimage of the year, as recommended by the Association's Ecclesiastical Adviser, Rev. Fr. Roberto Luanzon, Jr., O.P.

The pilgrimage began at the Santísimo Rosario Parish with a send-off blessing from Rev. Fr. Efren Rivera, O.P. Participants shared that the pilgrimage deepened their faith, heightened their appreciation of 16th-century churches and architecture, and gave them the joy of reconnecting with fellow Thomasians in prayer and fellowship.

This Jubilee Year, observed every 25 years and proclaimed by the late Pope Francis, will conclude on 6 January 2026. 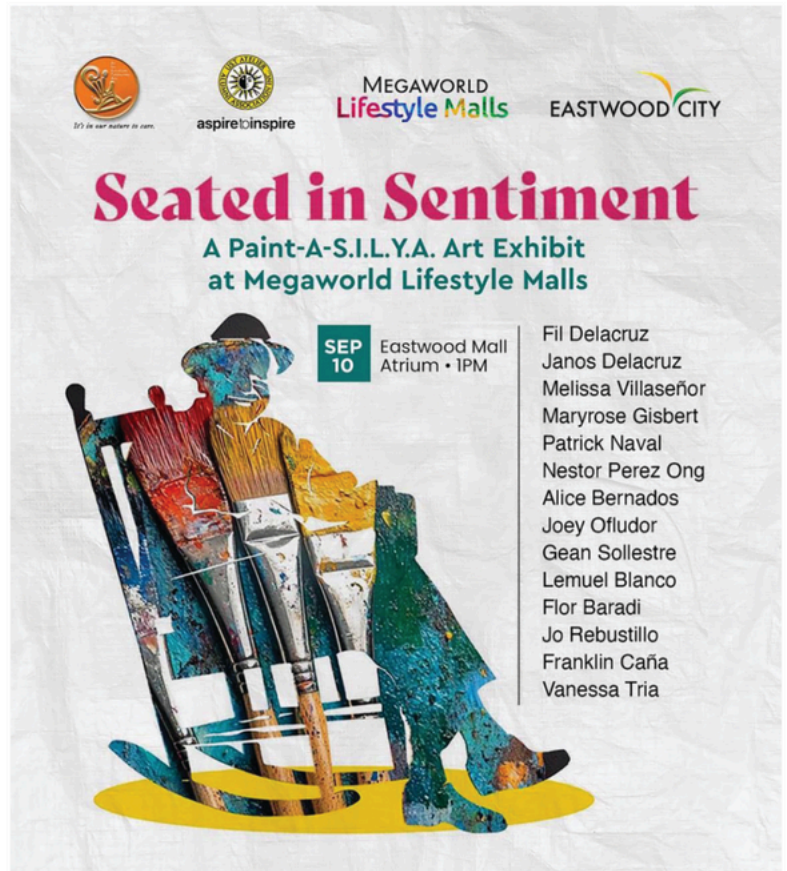
